INTRODUCTION.

1. The comments contained in the following pages are designed to assist the reader in interpretation of the principal statistical tables published in this Abstract. A short descriptive statement is given under each heading together with, where appropriate, definitions of terms and other explanatory notes necessary towards a proper understanding of the import of the statistical material included in the body of the Abstract. Only brief comment on each subject is possible within the compass of these notes; and the statistical tables themselves are of necessity published in summary form only. For greater statistical detail in respect of any particular class of material the reader is referred to the more specialized publications of the Office of Statistics, to Departmental Reports, the Blue Book and other cognate sources. A list of publications of the Office of Statistics is given on the back cover.

2. Methods of compilation of statistics compiled in the Office of Statistics are given in certain of the stencilled statistical bulletins regularly issued by that Office. Since it has not yet been possible to publish under one cover an adequate description of methods and caveats necessary towards the proper interpretation of these statistics the following references are cited as implementing the necessarily brief notes on methodology contained in the following pages:-

DEMOGRAPHY.

Population.

3. Prior to the Great War the present territory of Palestine was administered as a part of the Turkish empire, and was comprised in three administrative areas: the Mutasarrifiyah of Jerusalem, responsible directly to Constantinople, and the two Mutasarrifiyahs of Acre and Nablus, which were part of the larger Vilayet of Beirut. From time to time the Turkish authorities made attempts to enumerate the population, but there was no attempt to tabulate the material and publish it in the manner of a modern census.

4. Between the years 1917 and 1922, the new British administration compiled figures of population based on estimates of all villages and towns prepared by government officers. The first real census of Palestine was undertaken in 1922, and the published results give a complete picture of the territorial and religious groupings of the people. A second census was taken in November, 1931, in which more detailed information was sought. The report of this census contains a wealth of descriptive material in addition to the very extensive tables.

5. Estimates of population in the years since the census of 1931 have been prepared by adding the recorded natural increase and the recorded excess of arrivals over departures to the census figures. Since members of His Majesty's Forces are not recorded on arrival or on departure, and since statistics of births and deaths among the nomadic Beduin are only fragmentary, these two groups are excluded from the 'settled' population on which birth and death rates are based. In order to arrive at a figure of 'total' population the number of Beduin enumerated in 1931 is added to the settled population; changes in the Beduin population being of unknown magnitude, no changes in this figure, 66,553, are made. His Majesty's Forces are excluded from all estimates, both 'settled' and 'total'. For years since 1931 a 'mean' population has been introduced, a weighted average of the five populations spaced at quarterly intervals from the end of the preceding year to the end of the year in question. The effect of temporary seasonal migrations is thus minimized.

6. Including the Beduin tribes as enumerated at the 1931 census, but not including members of His Majesty's Forces, the population of Palestine at the end of the year 1939 is estimated to have numbered 1,501,698. The relative proportions in the estimated population at the end of 1939 were: Moslems 61.7 per cent., Jews 29.7 per cent., and Christians 7.8 per cent. 'Others' numbered 12,150 the great majority of whom are members of the Druze community and live in the hills of Carmel and Galilee.

Births and Deaths.

7. Registration of births and deaths was made compulsory in Palestine by the Public Health Ordinance of 1920. The Registers are kept at the District Offices of the Department of Health. Registration is effected on the receipt of a completed form of notification, supplies of these forms being distributed to all doctors and midwives and in rural areas to the mukhtars (heads) of the villages. In towns the notification of births is effected almost entirely by doctors and licensed midwives (dayas), and the notification of deaths by doctors. In villages information of the occurrence of births is given by the parent or registered daya (midwife) to the mukhtar who completes the form for transmission to the Health Office of the District. Similarly on the occurrence of a death the mukhtar is informed by the relatives or person present at the time of death, and the particulars are recorded by him for notification to the Health Office. In order to secure accuracy of records in village areas mukhtars receive payment for each notification of a birth or death made by them. In rural areas it is not possible as yet to obtain certification of the cause of death by medical practitioners. As the records of births and deaths among Beduin tribes are only fragmentary, they have been excluded from all statistics.

8. There has been a general decline in the birthrate since it attained a peak value of 50.24 per 1,000 in 1926. The decline has been noted in each of the three principal communities, but essential differences between the community rates have persisted. The Moslem rate is consistently the highest, having varied between 46.42 (in 1939) and 55.48 (in 1926). The Jewish rate is consistently the lowest, varying from 28.02 (in 1939) to 35.16 (in 1924). The Christian rate is intermediate between the Moslem and Jewish rates and has varied from 31.31 (in 1939) to 40.12 (in 1924). It has held an intermediate position between the Moslem and Jewish rates in every year since 1923.

9. The decline in the Jewish birth rate has been due in the main to the existence of an essentially different birth rate between the older Jewish population and the immigrant Jewish population. As immigration has continued, the relative importance of the immigrant population has increased, and their generally lower birth rate has tended to decrease the rate for all Jews. In the same way the increasing proportion of Jews in the total population has been a factor in depressing the general birth-rate, quite apart from the effect of the decline within each community.

10. Despite the decline, all the rates are still high compared with those of other countries. The Jewish rate, the lowest, was higher in the decade from 1926 to 1935 than that of any European country except Roumania and despite the fall in the most recent years it is still surpassed in Europe only by the rates of Roumania and Portugal. The high Moslem rate is unsurpassed in any published vital statistics. In 1938 and 1939 this rate fell below 49 per thousand for the first time since 1922, and in most years it has been over 50 per thousand.

11. Palestine in recent years has shown a falling death-rate, from the highest figure of 26.88 per 1,000 recorded (in 1928), to the figure of 18.60 (in 1935), rates in 1936, 1938 and 1939 being even lower. In the five years 1931-35 the rate averaged 20.9 per 1,000. This was higher than for any European country, with the single exception of Malta, but it was exceeded by a number of American and Asiatic countries, as well as by Egypt. In 1935 the rate was below that of Roumania. The fall in the death-rate in Palestine has been chiefly due to the increasing proportion of the Jewish population, which has consistently shown a much lower death rate than that of other communities.

12. The Moslem death rate, however, has also shown a definite decline. In the years 1923-1929 it ranged between 26.30 and 31.74 per 1,000, while in the years since 1934 it has never attained 25 per 1,000. There is evidence of a three-year cycle in the Moslem death rate. The years 1925, 1928, 1931, 1934 and 1937 showed, with only one exception, higher death rates than the years immediately preceding and following them. The series of these high values, 29.25, 31.74, 26.21, 26.70, 24.56, indicates a small downward trend. The Jewish death rate has never exceeded 15 per 1,000 and since 1929 it has been below 10 per 1,000, reaching its lowest point, 7.57 per 1,000, in 1939. Rates below 10 per 1,000 were recorded in the five year period 1931-1935 only in Holland, Australia, New Zealand, Canada, South Africa and Hawaii, and such rates can only be maintained while the age structure is such that very young children and old people, the sections of the population in which the force of mortality is greatest, are relatively few. The lowering of the Jewish death rate in Palestine has been largely due to the immigration of large numbers of people in the early adult period of life when the risk of dying is at its lowest, and a considerable part of the lowering of the general death rate of Palestine has followed in consequence.

13. The infant mortality rates for the different communities in all years since 1922 are shown in table 32. All communities have shown a downward trend but the most marked has been in the Jewish community. The Jewish rate was 126.03 per 1,000 live births in 1923; it remained above one hundred until 1928. In that year it fell below one hundred and has since further declined, being below 60 in the last three years. The lowest rate recorded in any country in 1937 was 31 per 1,000 in New Zealand. The only other rates below 60 in that year were Australia (38), Netherlands (38), Sweden (46), Switzerland (47), Latvia (56) and England and Wales (58). The Jewish community therefore experiences a rate that will compare favourably with that of the most advanced countries of Europe. The Christian infant mortality rate, occupying as always an intermediate position between the Moslem and Jewish rates, stood at 100.56 per 1,000 live births in 1939. Its previous lowest was 103.98 per 1,000, in 1938. The Moslem rate was over 200 per 1,000 on four occasions in the post-war period, the last being in 1929. Since that date it has risen to a peak at three-yearly intervals, the figures being 186.50 in 1931, 175.34 in 1934 and 179.31 in 1937. It was below 150 in 1935 — for the first time — and again in 1936 and 1938; in 1939 it fell to 123.84.

14. The distribution of deaths according to age and religious community in the years since 1928 is shown in table 34. In order to draw any precise conclusion these deaths at each age require to be related to the population at each age among which they occur. In the absence of recent estimates of population by age only very obvious features can be examined. There is a great difference between the communities in deaths at ages over one month. This difference continues at all ages up to about 15 but it is most striking in the second, third, and fourth years of life. A feature of Palestine mortality statistics is the great loss of life in these early years. In the most advanced countries the loss of life in the first month has proved the most difficult to reduce, but at all subsequent ages of early childhood the loss of life has been reduced substantially, and it frequently happens that the total number of deaths aged 1-4 years (inclusive), falls below that of deaths in the first month. But in Palestine, in 1938, the losses at those ages, totalling 4,379, were almost three times as great as the losses aged under one month and in previous years they have been even higher. The Moslem community is the greatest sufferer in this respect, the Jewish community showing an experience more in keeping with that of European countries.

*Migration.**

15. The great extent of addition to the population by immigration has been the outstanding feature of the demography of Palestine in the post-war period. In the immediate post-war years, there was a considerable influx of returning emigrants from neighbouring states; but by 1922 the main stream of immigration consisted of new residents, the overwhelming majority of whom were Jewish. Registered Jewish immigrants in the period 1920-39 numbered 306,049, an influx large absolutely compared with post war migration movements in other countries and without recent parallel when considered in relation to the previous population and the size of the country.

16. Annual statistics of migration are given, in summary form, in tables 39-40 pages 31-37. The following brief comments will assist in the interpretation of the statistics:

(a) The summary of arrivals and departures (Table 39) affords an accounting of the effect of migration movements on the *de facto* population. The net effect of migration movements in any year on the permanent population may be quite different in amount (or even in sign) from the balance shown in this table since —

(i) Travellers normally form a considerable proportion of arrivals and departures in any year, as would be expected in view of the unique historic associations of Palestine.

(ii) Residents departing from year to year may include a varying proportion of persons who do not intend to return.

(b) For the year 1935 and since, a detailed classification of arrivals and departures has been made, which *inter alia* provides for distinction between residents departing for a period of one year or less and residents departing for more than one year. This permits of the numerical assessment of the effect of migration on the *de jure* population, if residents departing for more than one year are regarded as emigrants**. The balance between immigrants and emigrants so defined compares with the excess of total arrivals over departures as follows:—

(c) In recent years there has been a considerable unrecorded illegal movement across the land frontiers of Palestine and unrecorded illegal immigration by sea.

(d) Immigration is controlled by Government, legal immigrants falling into one or other of the categories shown in Table 41. The volume of immigration is regulated according to defined principles, a major consideration being the economic absorptive capacity of the country.

(e) Persons may enter the country as travellers: and if qualified to do so, may be subsequently registered as immigrants.

* For an adequate statistical and interpretative account of migration movements the reader is referred to the Annual Reports of the Department of Migration.

** There is reason for believing that this generally recognised convention does not apply strictly in the case of Palestine.

† Including 11,156 persons known to have landed illegally in Palestine, and to have remained, although liable to deportation.

AGRICULTURE.

17. Agriculture is the mainstay of the economy of Palestine, although, as indicated elsewhere, there has been considerable development of urban industries in recent years. Furthermore subsistence farming is still the rule over a considerable portion of the country: in spite of the inroads of commercial farming — mainly citrus growing — in the past decade. Some indication of the relative importance of agriculture is afforded by the statistics of geographical distribution of the settled population. The mean settled population of Palestine in 1939 was 1,405,000, of which total 661,000 or 47 per cent. lived in towns and 744,000 or 53 per cent. in the villages. The only rural industry of any importance is agriculture, the village population being supported almost entirely by agricultural pursuits. Again quite a material proportion of town dwellers find agricultural employment — particularly in citrus groves — during part of the year to an extent which would considerably outweigh the fact that the inhabitants of villages bordering on the larger towns often earn a supplementary income by urban work — notably in the building industry. Finally account must be had of the fact that much urban work in Palestine is ancillary to farm production. For example such urban industries as the transport of citrus fruits and the manufacture and repair of agricultural implements are directly dependent on local agriculture.

18. At the Census of 18th November, 1931, the latest date at which comprehensive statistics of the industrial distribution of the population are available, 53.3 per cent. of the total settled population was directly supported by agriculture. At that time 41 per cent. of the population resided in towns and 59 per cent. in villages. Comparison with the 1938 statistics of town/village distribution (47 per cent. towns; 53 per cent. villages) suggests the existence of some measure of urban drift of population since 1931. It must not be assumed, however, that the importance of agriculture relative to that of other industries has declined in like ratio. On the contrary it might be found that the direct or indirect means of support of a considerable proportion of the increase in town population is to be found in work created by the greatly increased agricultural production — particularly of citrus fruits — since 1931.

19. The character of agricultural production in this country is largely patterned by the peculiar climatic conditions: the entire absence of rainfall during six to seven months of the year, and inadequate water conservation resources, limiting the scope of production. For the most part crops are raised without irrigation, except in the citrus growing areas; but recently there has been a marked increase in the raising of fruits, vegetables and fodder on irrigated land. There are generally two crops harvested each year — cereal and leguminous crops in May and June and a summer crop in August and September. The cereals principally raised in Palestine are wheat, barley and durrah; the country also produces sesame, citrus fruits, melons, olives, grapes, bananas, figs and various other fruits and vegetables. In the north of Palestine tobacco is cultivated. Oranges, grapefruit, lemons and a few other varieties of citrus are grown in the coastal plain and in the Jordan valley and are the main articles of the Palestine exports.

20. Sheep and goat breeding is widely spread in all the districts of Palestine while the dairy industry and poultry breeding have developed considerably in recent years, especially in the Jewish agricultural settlements. The working animals of Palestine are donkeys, mules, camels and horses.

Agricultural Statistics (Tables 49-51).

21. The data contained in these tables are estimates of the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries, production being estimated, village by village, by the District Officers of the Department of Agriculture. The figures should be regarded as only approximate; exact enumerations of the yield of each crop after harvesting is not practicable. Statistics of yield include produce consumed on the farm as well as that marketed for consumption off the farm. The areas shown denote areas of crops in metric dunums. In many instances more than one crop is grown on the same land during each season.

The second part of Table 49 contains index numbers of the volume of crops, except citrus fruits, tobacco and fodder for the dairy industry, based on the actual data published in Tables 49 and 51. The principle of the construction of these index numbers is that of the Aggregate Index; the average crops as estimated during the period 1926 to 1930 are used as a base for comparison, and the average prices recorded during the years 1935 to 1939 (no previous records of prices of most crops are available) are used as weights.

22. The only available measure of the yield of citrus is provided by the statistics of the export of citrus fruits. Citrus fruits are exported in cases and in bulk. Cases of various sizes are in use. The average net weight of a packed case of citrus fruits was estimated at 33 $\frac{1}{2}$ kilos in respect of the years 1936 to 1938. In the 1938/39 and 1939/40 seasons larger sizes of cases were prevailing, and the average net weight of a packed case was roughly estimated at 37-38 kilos for oranges, 34-35 kilos for grape-fruits and 35-36 kilos for lemons.

Production of Tobacco (Tables 52).

23. The areas under tobacco plantations and the crops are registered with the Department of Customs, Excise and Trade each year in accordance with provisions of the Tobacco Ordinance. Since production of this commodity is controlled the statistics can be regarded as more exact than those for other crops.

Animal Husbandry (Tables 58-61).

24. The latest enumeration of the livestock of Palestine was made in 1937, the enumeration being based on the report of mukhtars (the official village head-men).

FORESTRY.

25. Palestine is practically denuded of natural high forests, though about 140,000 dunums, mainly in the Galilean Hills are covered with scrub forest of some commercial value but of little utility as a natural means of water conservation or as a barrier against soil erosion. Afforestation work in this country is greatly hampered by the existence of grazing rights in a considerable proportion of the few remaining forest areas; but an attempt has been made by Government to conserve existing forests and areas suitable for afforestation, though of little value for other purposes, by the declaration of Forest Reserves on which revival operations and afforestation are carried out. The total area of such reserves and the additions in each of the last two years are shown in Table 62.

26. Private afforestation in Palestine has mainly taken the form of plantings of pine and eucalyptus, some 20,000 dunums having been planted by private agency up to 31st March, 1939. Statistics of such plantings are shown in Table 63.

27. It should be noted that available local supplies of wood—mainly for firewood supplies—are implemented to a considerable extent (though quite inadequately) by prunings from olive trees, dead wood from old olive trees and “cut-outs” from citrus plantations. The area under olive trees and citrus (671,731 dunums and 299,500 dunums respectively) exceeds very considerably the area under purely forest trees.

28. Imports of wood and wood products are of considerable consequence, amounting to £P.1,135,638 in 1939, 7.8 per cent. of the total value of imports in that year. Wood for citrus cases is an outstanding item in this group, imports of this item totalling 129,376 cubic metres in 1939, valued at £P.567,111.

FISHERIES.

29. Palestine is possessed of adequate fishing resources both sea and lacustrine. In actual practice the full development of these resources has not been possible: the catch of fish—though considerable—accounting for but 25 per cent. of all fish consumed as food and 50 per cent. of consumption of fresh fish. The sea fisheries are spread among a number of fishing centres on the Mediterranean coast, transport difficulties preventing the exploitation of the considerable but undeveloped resources of the Gulf of Aqaba on the Red Sea. The sources of fresh water fish supplies are the Lake of Tiberias and the Huleh lake, while a recent development is the breeding as yet on a small scale—of fish in fresh water ponds. The output of the sea fisheries (in which before the war a number of foreign trawlers were engaged in addition to Palestinian boats) exceeds considerably that of the lakes.

30. Statistics of landings of fish are shown in Tables 64 and 65. The output is recorded by the Fisheries service of the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries, the values quoted representing prices paid to the producers.

MINERALS.

31. The mineral resources of Palestine capable at present of commercial exploitation are very restricted. As far as is known metallic minerals do not exist, nor does coal. The country, has, however, unique mineral resources in the Dead Sea—a highly concentrated solution of the chlorides of sodium, potassium and magnesium, also containing some bromine. Gypsum, limestone and clay for cement are also exploited while building stone of good quality abounds in the hill districts. Salt in a practically pure state is available in practically unlimited quantities at Jebel Udom near the Dead Sea, where it is hewn in blocks; while at Athlit salt is extracted from sea water basins by evaporation, the bulk of supplies being taken from this source. Sulphur is mined in Southern Palestine. Statistics of exports of Dead Sea chemical products (bromine and potash) are shown in Table 76, production of salt in Table 198 and production of cement in Table 200.

INDUSTRY.

32. While, as indicated earlier, Palestine is—and must be for many years to come—essentially an agricultural country there has been a very substantial industrial development during the past fifteen years. Imports of capital equipment for industrial enterprises have contributed very largely to the greatly increased flow of imports; and with the establishment of these industrial plants local production of manufactured products for home consumption has become increasingly important. In addition a not inconsiderable export trade in manufactured commodities has developed both in processed local raw materials—e.g. Dead Sea chemical products, essential oils, and in manufactures from imported raw materials, e.g. wearing apparel, vegetable oils, polished rice, artificial teeth. Very small scale industries and handicrafts still predominate, though many of the traditional handicraft industries have been subjected to an increasing pressure of competition from cheap imported goods and also, to some extent, from the products of the relatively newly established local factories. Changes in habits of consumption have also adversely affected the market for many handicraft products; though, on the other hand, the substantial tourist trade* stimulated production and export of some classes of local handicraft products—notably articles of piety. The character of industrial production in each of the more important divisions and the statistics of recent development are referred to, briefly, in the following paragraphs.

Manufacturing.

33. Both handicraft and factory industries produce, in general, goods for local consumption such as foods, beverages, tobacco and cigarettes, clothing, furniture, building materials, newspapers and magazines, tools, stationery. The chief articles of industrial export are Dead Sea chemicals, cement, alcoholic beverages, — all made from local material; souvenirs and vegetable oils, partly from local material; and wearing apparel, chocolate, artificial teeth — made from imported materials.

VIII.

34. The only official census of manufacturing industries was taken in 1928 and covered 3,505 industrial undertakings in which 17,955 persons were employed, including owners, technical and clerical personnel and contract labour. Since that date three censuses of Jewish industry and handicrafts have been taken by the Jewish Agency for Palestine and resulted in the following summary figures:—

More detailed statistics of the 1937 census of Jewish manufacture are published, by the courtesy of the Jewish Agency, on pages 175—177.

35. The only statistics of manufacture collected and compiled by Government since the industrial census of 1928 relate to manufacture of commodities subject to excise duties and to production of cement. Following are observations on the figures which are given in Tables 196—198.

- (a) The production figures quoted in respect of tobacco, tobacco products, salt and matches are derived from excise returns and correspond to annual deliveries and not to actual output.
- (b) Statistics of production, as well as deliveries of intoxicating liquors are available. The figures, (quoted in Table 197) of alcoholic content of spirits (arak, cognac and other spirits) do not necessarily show a balance between production, consumption and export. Arak may be re-distilled from other spirits; cognac may be used in fortifying wine, while surplus production of potable spirits may be converted into methylated spirits for industrial use.

Building Activity.

36. Apart from agriculture, building and the manufacture of building materials constitute the most important industrial group in Palestine. Building activity was particularly high in the years 1933—35 owing to the arrival of large numbers of new settlers and a consequently chronic shortage of housing accommodation. Building activity decreased towards the end of 1938 and the disturbed political conditions since that year have resulted in a fall in building to a level only a fraction of the 1933—35 totals (vide page 52). Stone quarrying and dressing and the manufacture of cement are the most important of the industries directly connected with building.

Statistics of building activity in municipal areas are published in Tables 66 and 67. These figures are based on permits issued by the municipal authorities; so that the figures for any period do not necessarily indicate exactly building activity in that period, since permits may be taken out some time prior to the actual commencement of work. The figures of square metres of floor area of new building authorised in the four towns published in Table 68 afford a good indication of fluctuations in the quantum of building production in those towns, subject, particularly in respect of short period comparisons, to the qualification indicated above.

Electric Power.

37. The development of electric power production in Palestine in the past decade has been remarkable. The chief producers of electricity are the Palestine Electric Corporation Ltd. and the Jerusalem Electric and Public Service Corporation Ltd. The former owns steam generating stations at Haifa and Tel Aviv and a waterpower station at Naharayim on the Jordan. The latter owns a generating station in Jerusalem. In 1939 the combined sales of both corporations exceeded 90 million kilowatt hours. More than half of the power sold was used for industrial purposes and irrigation, many of the local factories and workshops are electrified, and there is extensive rural electrification in the Jewish settlements and in the orange groves of the plains.

Statistics of the activities of the Palestine Electric Corporation and the Jerusalem Electric and Public Service Corporation are published in Table 109.

IX.

RETAIL AND WHOLESALE TRADE.

38. There are no official statistics of wholesale or retail trading; but by the courtesy of the Jewish Agency, summaries of statistics of Jewish retail and wholesale trade in 1937 are published in Tables 210 and 211.

FOREIGN TRADE.

39. The post-war period has witnessed a remarkable development in the foreign trade of Palestine. The value of exports has increased from £P.1,412,520 in 1923 to £P.5,117,769 in 1939; while imports increased from £P.4,945,907 to £P.14,632,522 in the same period. The relatively high importance of foreign trade in the economy of this country is illustrated by the following table showing, in Palestinian pounds, foreign trade per head of population in Palestine and in neighbouring countries during 1938:—

The "adverse" balance shown in the case of Egypt is not typical; in most years that country has a credit visible trade balance. Iraq, Syria and Palestine have had in recent years consistently "adverse" visible trade balances; but, as indicated by the table, the foreign trade of Palestine per head is very much larger than in these other countries—as is the excess of imports.

40. Analysis of the commodity trade statistics of Palestine over a period of years indicates the existence of a persistent import surplus. During the quinquennium 1923—27 the value of exports was 25 per cent. of that of imports while the average ratio in 1933—39 was 32 per cent. The maintenance of a visible trade situation of such unbalance over a long period of years is an indication of the existence of a considerable inflow of credits on account of invisible items, the most important contributing sources being: (1) Imports of capital (2) Tourist expenditures, donations to religious organisations, etc. The gap between exports and imports lessened considerably between 1933 and 1938; but the ratio of exports to imports fell in 1939 due to decreased exports of citrus fruits—a consequence of shipping difficulties owing to the War. Following are quotations of percentage ratios of exports to imports:—1933, 25; 1936, 30; 1937, 39; 1938, 48 and 1939, 35. The reasons for the advance in the ratio of exports to imports are: (1) the growth in exports consequent on the rapid development of the citrus industry and the increased exports of certain manufactured commodities and (2) the decline of import trade from the 1935 peak level—due partly to lowered immigration and partly to the disturbed condition of the country.

41. While the persistence of a markedly adverse visible trade balance is probably the most striking feature of the foreign commodity trade of Palestine, the distribution of that trade also shows special characteristics of considerable social and economic significance. The dominance of citrus fruits in the export trade is particularly striking, exports of citrus fruits accounting for 77 per cent. of the total value of exports in the quinquennium 1933—39, and 66 per cent in the twelve months ended in May, 1940—which period is taken as covering the latest citrus export season. Dead Sea chemicals—Potash and Bromine—have become, after citrus, the next important item of export. Soap, once second in importance, has declined with the virtual closing of the Egyptian market. There are no other very large items but noteworthy are—artificial teeth, vegetable oils, polished rice, cotton yarn and threads. The dependence of Palestine's export trade on the citrus industry is of great moment; income from exports, and the well-being of a large section of the community, are

closely dependent on prices received for citrus fruits in overseas markets. The restriction of markets for any considerable quantity of citrus exports** and the sensitivity of prices on these markets to increasing supplies of citrus fruits has resulted in a situation in which artificial restriction of the growth of the industry has become necessary. Even without further planting the crop available for export will increase as young plantations become more mature and Palestine is faced with the problem of marketing an ever increasing crop.

42. While the export trade of Palestine is of very limited range imports are widespread. Imports of food-stuffs are still of considerable importance—particularly in years of poor cereal harvests. While agricultural production for local consumption has increased very materially in recent years both in quantity and variety of commodities (vide page 39) production of the considerable range of such commodities that can be successfully raised in Palestine is not yet sufficient for the growing needs of an increasing population. Consequently imports of food have tended to account for a relatively constant proportion of a vastly increased import trade; the percentage of imports of food to total imports in the quinquennium 1923-27 and 1935-39 being 27 and 25 respectively.

43. Imports of "articles mainly manufactured"—which omnibus heading, incidentally, disguises the inclusion of a wide range of capital equipment—have increased from an annual average value of £P.3,358,992 in the quinquennium 1923-27 to £P.8,754,469 in the quinquennium 1935-39. While a precise classification of imports according to the purpose for which they are intended is not yet available, a rough indication of the extent to which capital equipment and raw materials for industry contribute to the import trade of Palestine is afforded by the following necessarily incomplete enumeration of commodities of this nature included in the import trade of the year 1939:—

The total of the above items (£P.6,343,000) represents 59 per cent. of the combined value of imports of raw materials and manufactured commodities in 1939 and 43 per cent. of the total value of imports in that year. In addition, account should be taken of the fact that a considerable proportion of imports of motor vehicles, motor spirits and lubricating oils may be regarded as the "raw material" requirements of the road transport industry. The value of imports of these items in 1939 was £P.795,000. The figures quoted in this paragraph afford evidence of the high importance of capital equipment and producer's materials in the import trade of this country.

** Four countries took 91.0 per cent. of citrus exports in 1939-40 — United Kingdom 67.9 per cent.; Holland 12.2 per cent.; Belgium 6.6 per cent. and Sweden 4.2 per cent.

44. A close relationship is normally observed between changes in the ratio of imports and in the flow of immigration. In fact imports of manufactured goods which, as indicated above, include a large quantity of capital equipment, were in almost straight line relationship with the number of immigrant arrivals.* Imports of the personal effects of immigrants—which item includes the tools of trade, furniture, etc. of intending settlers—are high compared with the figures for most countries. The value of imports of this item in 1939 was £P.749,335, 5 per cent. of the total value of imports. It should be noted that imports of personal effects, though quite properly included in the trade accounts, do not represent a charge on Palestinian funds; while, again, such part of other imports of capital goods as represents the equipment of newly arrived immigrants (e.g. the machinery equipment of immigrant manufacturers) cannot be regarded as a charge on exports. The latter fact is of particular consequence in the case of immigrants from countries where restrictions on the purchase of foreign exchange are operative.

The Statistical Tables.

45. Statistics of foreign trade, in summary form, are included on pages 55-51 (Tables 69-86). More detailed statistics are published in the Blue Book and in the annual publication "Statistics of Imports, Exports and Shipping" while monthly trade statistics are included in the General Monthly Bulletin published by this Office. Consideration of the following limiting factors and definitions of terms is necessary towards a proper understanding of the significance of the figures:—

(i) Trade with Trans-Jordan is not included in the statistics. According to the Trans-Jordanian statistics of trade Trans-Jordan exported to Palestine in 1939 goods to the value of £P.477,438, while that country bought from Palestine in the same year Palestine produce valued at £P.65,181 besides foreign goods duty paid in Palestine subsequently consumed in Trans-Jordan valued at £P.249,475. While these amounts are not large in relation to the total foreign trade of Palestine, it should be emphasised that the import of Trans-Jordanian produce is confined to a few commodities, the import of cereals being the major item — particularly in seasons of poor harvest. This fact is of considerable importance in the interpretation of recorded statistics of imports of these commodities. For example the import statistics show that imports of wheat in 1939 totalled 78,048 metric tons; but, in addition, there was an import from Trans-Jordan of 33,909 tons.†

(ii) Imports of military stores and equipment and N.A.A.F.I. stores (commodities for consumption by His Majesty's Forces) are now excluded from the totals of imports quoted in statistical publications** the exclusion dating from the beginning of 1938. These commodities are included in the figures compiled for previous years — prior to 1937 as miscellaneous and unclassified items, and, in 1937, in the itemised accounts. Prior to 1936 the amount involved was not large but imports of this class in 1936 were valued at £P.579,095; and in 1939, at £P.2,521,036 — a total of some consequence as compared with the total value of all other imports (£P.14,632,822).

(iii) Personal effects are included in the recorded totals of imports as is customary in countries where immigration is significant. The values given for this item must, from its nature, be regarded as approximations only.

(iv) Exports are valued at the values declared by exporters at the time of export: the basis of valuation is "free on board" at port of loading. The value of imports represents the value which an importer would give for the goods delivered to him at the port of import free of freight charges, insurance and all other costs to the port of import — but not customs duties. Valuation of citrus fruits presents a difficulty in that there is a time lag of at least 14 days between the shipment of the goods and their sale overseas. Consequently in a period of rapid price change, the exporter's estimate at the time of export is subject to an appreciable margin of error. The matter assumes importance — particularly in short period comparisons

— in view of the high importance of citrus fruits in the export trade of this country*. Valuation of exports of citrus fruit in bulk must be regarded as approximate only. Most of this fruit is of second grade quality (large sizes) exported to Syria in many instances for what it will fetch. Bulk exports are, however, relatively unimportant.

(v) The statistics of exports are compiled from the Customs manifests. Owing to the fact that some time must inevitably elapse between the actual movement of goods and completion of the documents, statistics of exports and statistics of loading will not relate to exactly corresponding periods of time. Consequently short period statistics of shipments and of exports differ — in some instances quite materially.

(vi) In the interpretation of annual statistics of trade consideration must be given to the fact that the calendar year—the most convenient time unit for international comparisons—does not correspond with the export season. For example exports in the calendar year 1939 include the peak months of the 1938/39 citrus export season and the early months of the 1939/40 season, while the early exports of the 1938/39 season come within the calendar year 1938. Exports of the new season's crop are normally heavy in the first three months of the year, with the result that quite a different picture may be presented by export statistics on a calendar year basis from that shown by exports for single complete seasons. (Table 74 gives citrus exports for years ending in May.)

(vii) Statistics of trade with individual countries (Tables 75-78 pages 78-81) are subject to certain reservations. Imports are recorded by country of origin which is easily ascertainable from the documents, but the final destination of exports is not always known at the time of export**. This is a universal difficulty; estimates of the balance of trade between any two countries invariably disagree according to the accounts of each country concerned to a greater extent than is accounted for by differences in the basis of valuation. A point of particular significance in the interpretation of Palestine statistics of trade by countries is the relatively high proportion of personal effects in the imports from certain countries. For example, imports of personal effects from Germany in 1939 totalled £P.525,751, 33 per cent. of the total value of imports from that country. This item is in a somewhat different category from normal commercial trading.

(viii) Statistics of import trade by countries for years before 1934 are classified according to countries of consignment; while the figures for 1934 and subsequent years are on the basis of country of origin (vide Tables 78, 80).

(ix) Statistics of trade in living animals not for food (value in 1939 £P.33,671) are subject to considerable reservations. In the first place valuation is difficult; while, again, it is not easy to establish the country of origin. For example many camels arrive in Palestine from Trans-Jordan (not recorded in the statistics) and subsequently move to Egypt. Since 1938 an endeavour has been made to classify such animals as re-exports.

(x) There is a transit trade of some consequence through Palestine to and from Iraq by the trans-desert motor route. This trade was not recorded prior to 1935 but has since been included in Palestinian transit statistics (value in 1936, £P.192,418).

(xi) Exports of Bromine recorded in the export statistics represent quantities drawn each month from the company's stocks. These stocks are located not in Palestine but at Port Said. Transit from the Dead Sea to stock is not compiled.

(xii) Miscellaneous inclusions and omissions —

- (a) Ships stores and bunker coal and oil are not included in the statistics of trade.
- (b) Bullion and specie is shown separately and not included in the general totals Specie is shown at its face value.

* This difficulty is not peculiar to Palestine but is encountered in the countries exporting products of the soil for auction overseas.

** For example oranges may be consigned to the United Kingdom and subsequently sold there to a continental purchaser.

(c) Fish arriving from the sea fishing grounds in Palestinian boats is not included.

(d) Crude oil loaded at Haifa from the I.P.C. pipe line from Iraq is not included in the statistics of transit trade, but is recorded and published separately. The oil is valued at an arbitrary price in the statistics (800 mils per ton).

(e) Imports of Government stores are included in the itemised accounts of trade for 1937, 1938 and 1939.

(f) Imports by all institutions entitled to exemption from import duties were compiled only under the consignee headings prior to 1937. In that year they were itemised as far as possible and included in the general totals shown for each appropriate item. After 1937 military and N.A.A.F.I. stores were excluded; but imports by other institutions entitled to exemption continue to be included in the itemised statistics.

TRANSPORTATION AND COMMUNICATION.

Ports.

46. The ports of Palestine open for customs purposes are Haifa, Jaffa (including Tel Aviv), Acre and Gaza. The only modern harbour is the one at Haifa, providing a depth of 30 ft. alongside the main quay. Jaffa port contains a small craft harbour at Jaffa and a lighter harbour at Tel Aviv. At Jaffa and Tel Aviv vessels anchor at open roadstead, and cargo is discharged into lighters which in turn discharge at quays inside the small craft harbour or the lighter harbour. Large vessels rarely call at Acre and Gaza.

The construction of the Haifa harbour was completed in 1933; loading and discharge of goods at Tel Aviv lighter harbour commenced in 1936.

Coastal trade and internal water transport are insignificant in Palestine.

Large quantities of crude oil are shipped from Haifa which is the point at which the Southern branch of the Iraq Petroleum Company's pipe line from Kirkuk in Iraq reaches the Mediterranean. Shipments of refined oils produced by the Consolidated Refineries Ltd. at Haifa have commenced recently.

Statistics of Shipping.

47. The shipping statistics of Palestine (Tables 87-95) are derived from the records of vessels entered at and cleared from the ports of Palestine, kept by the Port Managers. In the part relating to the aggregate weight of cargo discharged and loaded these records are supplemented by the records kept at the Customs Stations.

The tonnage of cargo and the registered tonnage of ships are given to the nearest ton in all cases. The tonnage of vessels denotes the registered net tonnage, according to the regulations adopted in the countries of registration. The tonnage of cargo handled at ports is shown in metric tons of weight.

As from 1938 the figures relating to Sailing Vessels include small motor boats.

Railways.

48. The railway system of Palestine comprises three main sections:—

(a) The standard gauge Palestine Railway, running from Haifa to Rafah on the Egyptian border and with branches from Lydda to Jerusalem and Jaffa. A short branch to Petah Tiqva is partly owned by that colony. The total length of this system is 333 kilometres.

(b) The Sinai Railway (Kantara—Rafah line) crossing the Sinai province of Egypt, owned by His Majesty's Government and worked by the Government of Palestine connects Palestine with the Egyptian railway system at Kantara on the Suez Canal. Its length is 203 kilometres.

(e) The narrow gauge Hejaz Railway, including Haifa—Acre, Haifa—Samakh and Tulkarm—Nablus sections in Palestine and the Nassib—Amman—Ma'an section in Trans-Jordan the last section being used by the Trans-Jordan Government though operated by the Palestine Government. The length of the line in Palestine is 144 kilometres, and in Trans-Jordan 323 kilometres.

The total length of the railways on the territory of Palestine is therefore 333 kilometres of standard gauge and 144 kilometres of narrow gauge (105 cm.).

Railway Statistics (Tables 96-102).

49. All figures except those shown in Table 102 relate to the financial years ending 31st March. Table 6 shows capital investment in the Palestine Railways and the lines operated by the Administration of the Palestine Railways. The figures in italics denote the amounts invested by the Palestine Railways in other Operated Lines. The figures in italics in Table 8 show the deficit of the Railways. Tables 99 to 102 contain an analysis of the traffic and the financial results of the Palestine Railways and Operated Lines for a number of years.

Road Transportation.

50. The length of all weather roads in Palestine at the end of 1939 was 2,277 kilometres. In addition there were 1,609 kilometres of dry-weather roads. The recent years have witnessed a rapid development of motor transport. Regular communication is established between the cities of Palestine, serving both passengers and goods traffic.

There are no tramways in Palestine. Inter-urban communication is effected by omnibuses and by fleets of motor cars licensed as public vehicles.

Motor Vehicles Statistics (Table 104).

51. The registration of motor vehicles is effected by the Traffic Offices which are a part of the Department of Police and Prisons. All motor vehicles brought to Palestine for use on roads have necessarily first to be registered and thereafter licensed annually. The lists of motor vehicles registered are periodically revised. The difference between the figures for "Registered" and "Licensed" represents the number of motor vehicles in the country still registered but not actually in use, some of which are no longer fit for use.

Commercial Road Transport Statistics (Table 106).

52. The figures presented in Table 106 are directly supplied by six large road transportation agencies, all the six agencies being Jewish co-operative societies. The lines operated by these societies connect localities where the Jewish population is concentrated.

Statistics of Road Accidents (Tables 107 and 108).

The statistics of roads accidents are compiled by the Police authorities on the basis of the records kept by the Traffic Police. No records are available for 1938.

Civil Aviation.

53. Air services in Palestine make use of three aerodromes at Lydda, Haifa and Tel Aviv and two seaplane stations—at Haifa* and Tiberias—customs and migration facilities for travellers abroad being provided at all stations except Tel Aviv. There is also a landing ground for local flights at Ashdot-Yaakov in the Jordan Valley. Local services provide communication with Cyprus, Syria, Egypt and Iraq, and there are through services to England, Empire, India, the Far East and Australia.

Statistics of civil aviation are now being compiled from the log books kept at each landing station. Full information is available only since January, 1939.

Posts, Telegraphs, Telephones, Wireless.

54. Postal despatches are exchanged regularly between all principal cities of Palestine. At the close of 1939 there were 60 post offices and 20 postal agencies. The length of the telegraph and telephone lines was 95,513 kilometres in local systems and 21,096 kilometres in trunk lines. The number of telephone instruments in use was 17,401. A broadcasting station, operated by the Government, was established in 1936, and daily programmes are transmitted in English, Arabic and Hebrew, and the number of wireless receiving licences in force, at the end of 1939 was 42,577.

Statistics of the operations of the Department of Posts and Telegraphs are given in tables 109-111.

PRICES.

55. Statistics of wholesale and retail prices are collected by the Government Statistician at weekly intervals (wholesale) and monthly intervals (retail), index numbers being compiled from this data affording a measure of the direction and extent of price changes in Palestine. The methods of compilation and limits to the application of the statistics are indicated in the following paragraphs:—

Wholesale Prices (Tables 133-136).

56. Statistics of wholesale prices in the four main towns, from which monthly index numbers are compiled, are collected by the Government Statistician. Prices ruling on Thursday of each week are collected, from which monthly average prices are computed. This system was brought into operation in 1936 but a historical table (table 130) giving a continuous series of index numbers back to 1920 has been constructed from a pre-existing series of index numbers compiled for those years by the Department of Customs. The commodities included in the present index are 53 in number, subdivided into three groups; Grain and Meat (18 items), Other Foods and Fruit (21 items) and Fuel and Miscellaneous (14 items). Separate index numbers are compiled for each group as well as an all group index; but index numbers are not compiled for individual towns, nor is a distinction made—as in the case of retail prices—between the Arab and Jewish communities. The wholesale prices index is an unweighted geometric average of month to month price ratios chained to June, 1936, as base. While the index adequately covers foods marketed as wholesale it does not, as yet, give a sufficient representation to producers' materials and consumers' goods other than foods. The reconstruction of the index is under consideration; and to this end the number of commodities for which prices are collected has been increased, including building materials. Statistics of prices of building materials are published in table 134.

57. While the majority of imported commodities can be adequately represented in a wholesale price index for Palestine, the position in respect of locally produced commodities is not so strong. For example much local wheat (and also a considerable proportion of imported wheat) does not come on the Palestinian wholesale market but is purchased direct by the millers by private treaty with the growers (or overseas merchants). Again perishable farm products grown by Arab farmers are often sold direct from grower to final consumer, though most Jewish produce of this type is marketed at wholesale through marketing societies.

Retail Prices (Tables 137-143).

Until January, 1940, statistics of retail prices were collected from Arab and Jewish retail markets in Jerusalem, Jaffa, Tel Aviv and Haifa at monthly intervals, the prices quoted in tables 138-143 being market prices on the 15th day of the month. Through the courtesy of the Municipal Corporations who act as district agents for this Office in the collection of retail prices statistics, the Office has been able to collect the quotations at weekly intervals since January, 1940. The index numbers for 1940 are, consequently, based on monthly average prices, i.e. the average of four or five weekly quotations, a procedure which gives more accurate results than the collection of price quotations on a single day in the month. The units of quantity for which retail prices quotations are collected and published are the local units of weight and measure in which trading is actually carried out—(vide page 1 for metric and British equivalent).

In addition to compiling and publishing records of prices of certain essential commodities, the Office of Statistics also compiles an index number indicative of average changes in retail prices (vide table 137). With the introduction of the new system of collection and in view of the difficulty of carrying out a family budget inquiry, the Office of Statistics has revised its cost of living index numbers.

The principal changes brought into effect have been :—

- (a) differentiation between the Arab and Jewish urban communities, a separate index being compiled for each community. (The previous index related to an average urban Palestinian family without distinction between communities).
- (b) the compilation of separate indices for each community in each of the four main towns, Jerusalem, Jaffa, Tel Aviv and Haifa, as well as an average index for each community for Palestine as a whole. (Previously only one index was compiled for the whole of Palestine based on averages of prices in Jerusalem, Jaffa and Haifa; Tel Aviv, a small town in 1922, was not included.)
- (c) the revision of the list of commodities and the bringing up to date of the weighting of the various commodities included in the index numbers. For this purpose, in the lack of a family budget inquiry, the Office of Statistics had recourse to various official and non-official sources of information including direct inquiries from a number of housewives.

The revised series of index numbers relate almost exclusively to food commodities, only two non-foods (kerosene and soap) being included. The index thus falls far short of completely covering all items entering into the cost of living of the average family and should not be interpreted as measuring changes in the cost of living. It is obvious that rentals or clothing prices, for example, may move to a greater or less degree or even in a different direction from food prices. Nevertheless, despite this limitation to its application, an index number of food prices serves a very useful purpose particularly in present circumstances. Family budget investigations carried out in other countries indicate that expenditure on food accounts for a very considerable proportion of total household expenditure ranging between 29.5 per cent. to 63.0 per cent.

LABOUR STATISTICS.

Wage Rates (Tables 112-116).

60. The information on the predominant and average daily wage rates was extracted from employers' returns in respect of Arab and Jewish labour and from reports of the labour unions in respect of Jewish labour. The information on wage rates in agricultural employment is supplied by the Agricultural Officers of the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries, by Farmers' Organisations and by labour unions. The index numbers of daily wage rates paid to Arab labour are based on employers' reports, those relating to Jewish labour are based on the union scale of wage rates supplied twice a year by the General Federation of Jewish Labour in Palestine. The index number for each industrial group is weighted by the number of earners who were engaged in the corresponding industry in November, 1931, when the last Census was taken, Jewish weights being determined in each case by the number of Jewish earners and Arab weights by the number of non-Jewish earners in the industries. No weights are used for each occupational group within industrial groups. For fuller description of the method used in the construction of the Palestinian index numbers of wage rates the reader is referred to the Wage Rates Statistics Bulletin issued by the Office of Statistics.

The information on the prevailing hours of work was extracted from the employers' returns of wage rates. In the Jewish industries an eight hours' working day is the rule; longer hours are worked in a number of small workshops. In many industrial undertakings, especially in the printing industry, the weekly hours of Jewish workers are less than 48, in most such cases being 47 hours per week.

Labour Disputes (Tables 122-128).

61. Information on labour disputes in the years before 1938 was supplied by officers of the District Administration. In 1938 reports on labour disputes, their causes, terms of settlement, workers involved, time lost, etc. were obtained directly by the Office of Statistics from the employers affected and from employers' and workers' organizations. Only disputes caused by demands of an economic nature are included. Tables 122 to 128 contain information on strikes and lockouts, i.e. cases of disputes where temporary stoppage of work has been wilfully effected by employers or by the workers employed at the establishments under dispute. No distinction is made between strikes or lockouts. Cases where work has been stopped for less than one day are not regarded as strikes or lockouts, nor are cases of sabotage without stoppage of work included in these tables.

62. Other definitions and rules adopted in the collection and compilation of the official statistics of labour disputes in Palestine were explained in detail in the Labour Disputes Bulletins issued by the Office of Statistics.

Statistics of Industrial Accidents (Tables 129-132).

The statistics of industrial accidents in Palestine are extracted from the annual returns of injuries and compensation supplied by employers of labour in specified industries in accordance with Section 10 of the Workmen's Compensation Ordinance. Due to certain changes in the interpretation of the Workmen's Compensation Rules in force and in the administrative procedure, the number of cases reported in 1938 showed an appreciable increase as compared with previous years. A further increase in the number of reports is expected in the future. There is a year's delay in the compilation of the statistics of industrial accidents as under the existing rules the employers are allowed a period of eleven months after the close of the year under report, to submit their annual returns.

For fuller particulars of industrial accidents in Palestine, accidents rates, compensation rates, etc. the reader is referred to Industrial Accidents Statistics Bulletin No. 4 issued in 1940.

Employment (Tables 118-121).

63. Statistics of employment in Palestine have been collected by the Office of Statistics since the beginning of 1938. No data are available for periods prior to January, 1938. Returns are collected each month from 368 employers of labour containing three items (1) Number of employees (2) Man-days worked during the month (3) Amount of Pay-roll. The following observations are necessary as a guide to the proper use of these statistics as a measure of changes in the employment situation :—

- (a) The figures as yet cover only a part of the employing establishments in the country — notable omissions being the building industry, road transport trading and financial institutions.
- (b) Owing to the limited scope of the statistics, Government Departments are over-represented in the sample — though this difficulty is in part met by the separation of salaried employees and daily wage earners in the statistical compilations. The figures given relating to daily wage earners in 330 manufacturing establishments form the series most significantly indicative of current economic trends.
- (c) Statistics of number of employees represent the total number given employment during the month—irrespective of the length of time worked. The statistics of man-days worked (1 man working 1 day=1 man-day) thus form the more accurate indication of trends in employment.
- (d) While changes in the amount of pay-roll are significant and interesting, it must be remembered in the interpretation of these statistics that pay-roll represents a combination of several variables and does not necessarily fluctuate in exact relationship to changes in employment. In particular it has been

observed that in some industries a fall in pay-roll is, on occasion, less than a fall in employment; due to the retention by some manufacturers of a skilled and relatively more highly paid cadre of skilled employees, and the dismissal of less skilled workers.

- (e) The monthly index numbers of employment are adjusted for variation in the number of working days in each month: and thus relate as nearly as practicable to equal intervals of possible working time.

GOVERNMENT FINANCES.

64. Government revenue fluctuated in the first ten years of the civil administration between £P.1,675,000 and £P.2,500,000 per year. In the four years 1932/33 to 1935/36 annual revenue increased rapidly, reaching £P.5,770,457 in 1935/36; with the disturbed conditions of the succeeding years revenue fell to £P.4,897,456 in 1937/38, but rose to £P.5,937,280 in 1938/39 and to £P.5,979,275 in 1939/40. The increase in revenue during the years prior to 1935/36 was accompanied by a substantial change in the relative importance of the main sources of revenue: receipts from Customs duties tending to form a much greater proportion of total revenue than was the case formerly (27.0 per cent. in 1921/22, 47.7 per cent. in 1935/36). This is not surprising in view of the rapid development of the country in the fifteen years prior to 1935/36. The share of customs revenue to total revenue fell to 40.8 per cent. in 1937/38, and to 32.1 per cent. in 1938/39 owing to the rise in grants in aid received from H.M. Government. It will be observed, however, that revenue derived from Customs duties accounted for 43.8 per cent. of revenue derived from local sources in 1938/39.

65. Revenue from taxes on agriculture has tended to become relatively less important since the War. Such taxes (the tithe, animal tax and rural house and land taxes) formed the main source of revenue under the Turkish regime and in the early years of the post-war civil administration. Revenue collected from tithes and animal tax in 1922/23 totalled £P.249,399, 13.8 per cent. of total revenue, and, in 1939/39, only £P.80,689—1.4 per cent. of total revenue. The fall in the yield from these taxes has been due, partly to a succession of bad harvests and partly to considerable modifications of the system of land taxation. The tithe was reduced from 12½ per cent. of the gross yield of farm produce to 10 per cent. (in 1925), replaced by a commuted tithe (in 1925); and finally the tithe and house and land taxes were abolished in 1935 being replaced by the Rural Property tax. The latter tax, introduced on completion of a topographical survey of rural areas, varies according to the class of land: the rural areas being classified into 16 categories according to quality of land, citrus land paying the highest tax per dunum while the rate is progressively reduced on poorer classes of land, no tax being paid on uncultivable land. In 1938/39 the rate on citrus land was reduced from 500 mils per dunum to 400 mils per dunum; in Acre sub-district the rate was reduced from 400 mils to 50 mils per dunum.

66. Government expenditure kept pace with revenue during 1920 to 1932; but in the boom period of the succeeding years lagged behind the rapidly rising revenue returns, with the result that by the end of 1935/36 a surplus of £P.6,627,810 had accumulated. In the disturbed conditions of the subsequent years total expenditure increased owing to heavy expenditure on security measures while at the same time revenue declined sharply, the surplus balance reducing to £P.2,400,839 on 31st March, 1938. In 1938/39, revenue exceeded expenditure by £P.244,608, owing to considerable grants from H.M. Government in U.K., amounting to £P.1,680,515. The cumulative surplus balance at 31st March, 1939, after deducting depreciation of investments amounted to £P.2,533,265.

The Statistical Tables (Tables 144-147).

67. Statistics of revenue in each year since 1920 are published in Tables 144-145 and statistics of expenditure in Tables 144 and 146. The setting up of an independent Treasury to administer the country's finances as a part of the civil administration dates back to July, 1920. The fiscal year, originally adopted for the Treasury's

annual statements and accounts, covered a period from 1st April to 31st March: the first full fiscal year began on the 1st April, 1921, and terminated on the 31st March, 1922. In 1927, the fiscal year was made to coincide with the calendar year, but in 1932 the original fiscal year (1st April to 31st March) was reinstated. To facilitate comparisons figures of total revenue and expenditure for the whole period from 1920 to 1938/39 published in Table 132 have been recast on basis of a uniform fiscal year (from 1st April to 31st March).

68. The analysis of revenue published in Table 145 is grouped into 12 main headings; the most important of these being customs, licences, taxes, etc. Fees of Courts receipts and reimbursements, and Posts and Telegraphs revenue. It should be noted that until 1929 the gross revenue and gross expenditure of Railways appeared in the appropriate headings of revenue and expenditure: but, as from 1929, only the net excess of railway receipts appears under revenue, or, alternatively, the net railway deficit appears as an item of expenditure.

69. Two of the important classes viz. Licences, Fees and Taxes, etc., and Fees of Courts, Receipts and Reimbursements, into which revenue is divided in the Summary in Table 145 include a variety of items all of which do not move in concert. The relative fall in importance of licences, taxes, etc., as a revenue heading is due to the inclusion of agricultural taxes in this heading. Some of the other items included, e.g. excise duties, urban property tax and stamp duties have increased considerably in yield in the past decade. The following further analysis of revenue in 1938/39 under this heading is informative:—

70. The heading Fees of Court, etc., shows a considerable increase in relative importance in recent years (8 per cent. of total revenue in 1922/23; 10.8 per cent in 1938/39). The following table shows, in respect of 1938/39, the relative importance of each of the several items coming under this heading:—

CURRENCY.

71. Under the Turkish Regime many European currencies circulated in Palestine side by side with Turkish money. In commercial and trade circles, however, preference was given to French currency, particularly the gold Napoleon piece of 20 francs. During the Great War, devalued paper Turkish currency drove metal coins out of circulation, causing great hardship to the population. After the occupation of Palestine by the British forces, Egyptian currency, then in use by the troops, was proclaimed legal tender, this currency remained in use in the early years after the War. A Palestine Currency Board was set up in 1924 and a new Palestinian currency was first put into circulation on 1st November, 1927. In this volume monetary values relating to periods prior to that date have been converted from Egyptian pounds to Palestinian pounds. Early in 1928 the new Palestine currency was made the sole legal tender.

72. The Palestine pound, at parity with the pound sterling, is divided into 1000 mils, and is issued as a paper note. Other paper notes are of the following denominations:— 500 mils, £P.5, £P.10, £P.50 and £P.100. There is also a provision for a gold coin of £P.1 but it has not been put into circulation. In addition to the paper notes, the currency comprises silver coins of 50 and 100 mils each, nickel coins of 5, 10 and 20 mils each and bronze coins of 1 and 2 mils each.

73. The Palestine currency is issued and controlled by a Currency Board in London, represented in Palestine by the Currency Officer in the Treasury: the Board's agents are Messrs. Barclays Bank (D.C. & O.). According to the Currency Ordinance the Palestine Currency Board is obliged to exchange on demand sterling for Palestine Currency and vice versa. It may, however, invest its sterling funds in British Government Securities (or in such other securities which may be approved by the Secretary of State). Net profits from the currency fund remaining after allowance has been made for reserves are paid annually to the Palestine Government as a contribution to the general revenue. In the years of its existence the Board has contributed to the Palestine Government a total of £P.810,000.

At 31st March 1939, the currency reserve fund (£.6,659,414) and the Investment Reserve Account (£.440,088) amounted to £.7,099,502 and were invested in the following manner:—

As the amount of currency in circulation at the 31st March, 1939, totalled £P.6,574,124, the assets were £.525,368 or 8.0 per cent. in excess of the face value of currency in circulation. Statistics of the value of currency in circulation are shown in Tables 150 and 151.

BANKING.

Banking Statistics (Tables 152-156).

74. Commercial banking facilities are provided in Palestine by three main groups of financial institutions, namely, foreign banks (branches of large foreign banks), local banks and credit co-operative societies. In principle credit co-operative societies differ from the ordinary commercial banks, but in their main activity of accepting money deposits and granting credit they perform for their members the same service as commercial banks. The existence on the one hand of foreign banks of long standing and on the other hand of highly developed credit co-operative societies, provided small opportunity for the establishment of local banks in the first post war decade. In the "boom" years of 1933 to 1935, however, a large number of small banks come into existence. At the end of March, 1938, there were, besides the six foreign banks and some 100 credit co-operative societies, no fewer than 70 local banks. Many of the local banks were small institutions, with limited capital and reserves. The average capital and reserves of these 70 local banks was only £P.21,277 in March, 1938.

75. Banking legislation aiming at strengthening the capital position of the existing local banks and limiting the number of new small institutions came into effect in October, 1937. According to the Banking (Amendment and Further Provisions) Ordinance, 1937, no company can be registered to carry on banking business in Palestine unless its subscribed capital is not less than fifty thousand pounds, of which not less than twenty five thousand pounds is paid up. Existing local banks whose subscribed and paid up capital was less than that the required amount, were given a period of nine months, i.e. up to July, 1938, to raise their subscribed capital to a sum not less than twenty-five thousand pounds and their paid up capital to a sum not less than ten thousand pounds, and a period of two years, i.e. up to October, 1939,

to raise their capital up to the minima* prescribed for new banks. As a result of the requirements regarding bank capital many smaller banks, unable to fulfill the provisions of the Ordinance, had to cease to carry on banking operations as defined by the Banking Ordinance. At the end of December, 1939, the number of local banks so operating had fallen to 30. (Certain credit co-operative societies** which had been converted into companies are also included in this figure).

70. Published banking statistics are extracted from monthly and half-yearly statements submitted by individual banks to the Treasurer under the Banking Ordinance, 1936. Mortgage banks are also required to furnish returns but their statistics are not published since only two mortgage banks come under the Ordinance and publication of totals for two concerns is contrary to the practice of the Office of Statistics. Credit co-operative societies are not required by Ordinance to submit monthly statements of their assets and liabilities but nearly all have agreed to do so on a voluntary basis at the request of the Registrar of Co-operative Societies. The number of reporting credit societies at the end of December, 1939, was 88, 33 urban and 55 rural.

* By the same Ordinance the minimum paid up capital of foreign banks was fixed at £. 100,000 or the equivalent thereof; while all banks are required to pay Government an annual fee of £P. 100.

** One in August 1938, one in January, 1939 and one in February, 1939.

The metric system is followed by the Government, and its use regulated by Ordinance, but the local weights and measures are still commonly employed. Those generally used with their equivalents in Metric and British weights and measures as shown in the Schedule to the Ordinance are as follows:—

NOTE:— The establishments have been divided into two classes: Handicrafts and Industry. Under the former are included artisan's shops which cater for the individual customer and are engaged in the so called neighbourhood and hand trades, repairs and service. As a rule they employ, together with the owner less than 5 persons, have an output of under £P.1,000 per annum and a capital considerably less than £P.1,000; in many of these, little or no power machinery is used. All the other establishments belong to the second class.

The data relating to costs and output contain two sets of summaries: (a) actuals for 1936 or the 12 months nearest to the census day, (b) calculation for full 12 months of 1936, the latter consisting of actuals plus adjustments in respect of the new factories established during 1936, or the old ones which were closed for several months of the year on account of the disturbances.
